AFRICA

Ethiopia: The national human rights body has revealed that some 38 prisoners currently under detention in connection with a September 2016 prison fire incident have been tortured by the authorities. <u>Africa News, 13 November 2017</u>

Kenya: The number of offenders who have not been convicted has significantly reduced in the country's remand facilities. <u>KBC, 4 December 2017</u>

Nigeria: Nigeria Prisons Service will begin the free distribution of drugs and other medical supplies to 65,000 prisoners in its custody. <u>World Stage, 9 November 2017</u>

Zambia: Hundreds of children as young as 10 are kept locked up with adult prisoners in Zambian jails, according to the country's Human Right Commission. <u>AA.com.tr, 8 December</u> 2017

AMERICAS

Brazil: A 43-hour-long riot at the Cascavel penitentiary in Parana left two prisoners dead and six others injured. <u>News 24, 12 November 2017</u>

Canada: Canada's prison service must find alternatives to locking up prisoners with serious mental illness, according to the federal correctional ombudsman. <u>The Epoch Times, 1</u> <u>November 2017</u>

Canada: The Ontario Superior Court of Justice has declared the country's solitary confinement laws unconstitutional. <u>Canadian Lawyer, 18 December 2017</u>

Colombia: Forty-two prisoners were allegedly injured after a prison search turned into riots in the Bellavista prison north of Colombia's second largest city, Medellin. <u>Colombia Reports,</u> <u>8 December 2017</u>

Mexico: Mexico's prison population has fallen by a fifth from its peak in 2014. <u>Business</u> <u>Insider, 22 December 2017</u>

United States: Black men who commit the same crimes as white men receive federal prison sentences that are, on average, nearly 20 percent longer. <u>The Washington Post, 16</u> <u>November 2017</u>

ASIA

Afghanistan: Integrity Watch Afghanistan (IWA) has reported that prisoners in Afghanistan's major prisons are kept in inhumane conditions due to poor management, corruption and embezzlement. <u>Tolo News, 12 November 2017</u>

China: Lawyers in China will be allowed to meet privately with clients who are convicted criminals and serving time in prison. <u>Global Times, 10 December 2017</u>

Indonesia: One prisoner died and three others were wounded during a riot at Indonesia's super maximum security island prison Nusakambangan. <u>Jakarta Globe, 8 November 2017</u>

Israel: Israel Prison Services officials have warned of severe overcrowding if the High Court of Justice's ruling to expand living quarters for prisoners is not implemented in the coming months. <u>The Jerusalem Post, 5 December 2017</u>

Japan: The ratio of elderly former prisoners who returned to prison within two years of being released rose 2.8 percent compared with a year earlier. <u>Kyodo News, 17 November</u> 2017

Philippines: Riot at overcrowded prison kills two prisoners and injures at least 10 others. <u>BBC News, 4 November 2017</u>

Uzbekistan: Uzbek President Shavkat Mirziyoyev has signed a decree ordering the first mass pardoning of prisoners in Uzbekistan's history. <u>Intellinews, 8 December 2017</u>

EUROPE

Denmark: The Danish Prison and Probation Service and architecture firm CF Møller have designed what they're calling the world's "most humane" maximum security prison. <u>Co.Design, 19 December 2017</u>

Germany: Germany's constitutional court has ruled against overpricing phone calls made by prison prisoners. <u>Reuters, 28 November 2017</u>

Romania: Overcrowding and poor conditions in Romania's prisons will see thousands of prisoners released early regardless of the crimes they have committed. <u>The Telegraph, 6</u> <u>November 2017</u>

UNITED KINGDOM

England and Wales: Legal aid for prisoners will be restored for three key categories of claims after the Ministry of Justice abruptly abandoned what was expected to become a supreme court battle. <u>The Guardian, 7 November 2017</u>

England and Wales: Children are being locked up for almost entire days in youth prisons, with some prevented from taking daily showers, a watchdog has warned. <u>Independent, 22</u> <u>November 2017</u>
