AFRICA

Nigeria: The Prison Service says it is partnering with the Institute of Chartered Mediation and Conciliations to increase awareness on mediation as a means of resolving conflicts with the aim of reducing the number of prisoners. <u>The Eagle Online, 6 November 2018</u>

South Africa: State patients unable to stand trial because of mental illnesses do not belong in prison, according to the Judicial Inspectorate for Correctional Services. <u>IOL, 26 November</u> <u>2018</u>

South Africa: Offenders who have been handed sentences of less than two years will serve their time doing community service in a bid to curb overcrowding in prisons. <u>IOL, 7</u> <u>December 2018</u>

AMERICAS

ASIA

Cambodia: A penal department official has raised concerns regarding the spread of communicable diseases and the degradation of mental health among prisoners in overcrowded prisons. <u>Khmer Times, 15 November 2018</u>

India: The Punjab and Haryana High Court has abolished the practice of keeping death row prisoners in solitary confinement in Haryana jails. <u>The Indian Express, 8 December 2018</u>

Myanmar: Reducing chronic overcrowding in Myanmar's prisons is an essential first step to reforming the criminal justice system, according to a report by a civil society group. <u>Frontier</u> <u>Myanmar, 19 December 2018</u>

EUROPE

Europe: The Council of Europe has published two reports reflecting, firstly, the trends in European prisons from 2005 to 2015 and, secondly, the evolution of foreign offenders in prison and under probation from 2009 to 2015. <u>Council of Europe, 4 December 2018</u>

Ireland: A rapist who successfully challenged whether a law stopping payment of the State's old age pension to prisoners was constitutional is entitled to €10,000 in damages. Independent.ie, 29 November 2018

Ireland: The number of sex offenders who are being released from prison without having undergone the State's main treatment programme has increased. <u>RTE, 2 December 2018</u>

Ireland: Hundreds of men and women are being forced to sleep on prison floors every month. <u>The Irish Times, 5 December 2018</u>

Portugal: Portuguese prison guards are striking to demand salary hikes and bonus payments for late shifts. <u>Federal News Network, 6 December 2018</u>

Russia: Eight prisoners in Russia's Far Eastern Sakha-Yakutia region have launched a hunger strike to protest conditions at the prison where they are being held. <u>Radio Free Europe, 7</u> <u>December 2018</u>

UNITED KINGDOM

England and Wales: The government is failing in its duty of care towards prisoners, as going to jail has become a "sentence to poorer health or healthcare. <u>Independent, 1 November</u> 2018

England and Wales: Women are giving birth in prison cells without access to proper medical care. <u>The Guardian, 13 November 2018</u>

England and Wales: Prisoners are to be allowed to make Skype video calls to their relatives - in a bid to stop the flood of mobile phones into jails. <u>Mirror, 17 November 2018</u>

England and Wales: The number of suicides among prisoners this year has already exceeded 2017's death toll. <u>The Guardian, 19 November 2018</u>

England and Wales: Britain's jails are failing to get a grip on record levels of violence, suicides, self-harm and drug-taking, the chief inspector of prisons has warned. <u>The Telegraph, 22 November 2018</u>

England and Wales: The prisons inspectorate is developing a new type of review to determine whether failing jails are making progress towards improving conditions. <u>Civil</u> <u>Service World, 21 November 2018</u>

England and Wales: Ministers have been urged to halt the planned rollout of pepper spray to prison officers after an analysis found it may have been used in breach of official guidance in almost two thirds of recorded incidents during a pilot scheme. <u>The Guardian, 15</u> <u>December 2018</u>

Scotland: The number of prisoners let out of Scottish jails on a home release tag has fallen by 75% after a man committed a "brutal" murder while on the run. <u>BBC News, 20 November</u> 2018

Scotland: Prisoners serving sentences of less than a year are set to be given the right to vote in Scottish Parliament and council elections, under plans outlined by ministers. <u>iNews, 14</u> <u>December 2018</u>

Scotland: Short prison sentences of 12 months or less in Scotland will be ended next year, the justice secretary has said. <u>The Scotsman, 22 December 2018</u>

UK: The UK has the highest number of prisoners serving life sentences in Europe, according to a report by Professor Dirk Van Zyl Smit and Dr Catherine Appleton of the University of Nottingham. <u>News and Star, 10 December 2018</u>

OCEANIA

Australia: Prisoners in Tasmania slept on mouldy mattresses, were not routinely issued enough sets of clothes to keep clean and slept in cells that were so damp that paint peeled off the walls. <u>The Guardian, 30 November 2018</u>
