Since 2000, the number of women and girls in prison worldwide has increased by 50% (and the number of male prisoners, by 18%). Most women in prison have suffered trauma, abuse and poverty. Prison takes a heavy toll on women, families and wider society, in developed and less developed countries alike.

At the event, we will launch the fourth edition of the World Female Imprisonment List, a comprehensive set of data on the numbers of women and girls imprisoned globally, by country and region, showing trends since 2000.

We will hear from experts on the main drivers of high female imprisonment, including representatives from NGOs engaged in ICPR's research and policy project, *Understanding and reducing the use of imprisonment*. This project examines patterns of imprisonment in ten contrasting jurisdictions across five continents: Kenya, South Africa, Brazil, the USA, India, Thailand, England & Wales, Hungary, the Netherlands and Australia.
